As a young person growing up, my Dad would often ask me how I was doing spiritually. You see, I had the privilege of being raised in a preacher's home. What I heard preached from the pulpit, I also saw lived out in my home. Both my Mom and my Dad "walked the talk" living a godly example in front of our family. How very fortunate I have been to have such a Godly heritage.

Dad was concerned about what was happening in my life and my relationship with God. Throughout my life God has allowed me to be accountable to




